In conjunction, the Washington County Tourism Promotion Agency (WCTPA) debuted a new marketing campaign for Washington County titled *The American Spirit Lives Here*. The focus of the initiative is to combine the many components of the county's local tourism industry together and provide an overarching message that illustrates a complete focus of the county's broad appeal.

At the launch event, we debuted our new slogan and commercial while highlighting the importance of authenticity in the advertising campaign. Washington County has a great story to tell as the home of some of the country's finest historical, entertainment and cultural attractions. The launch presentation outlined our continued partnerships with local tourism assets, such as the

Washington County Heritage Alliance, the Montour Trail Council, PONY Baseball & Softball, as well as attractions like The Meadows Casino Racetrack Hotel, Tanger Outlets, the Washington Wild Things and our county's two agricultural fairs.

We want to ensure *The American Spirit Lives Here* campaign tells *our* story and authentically captures the essence of what it means to visit Washington County. Our goal is to leave folks with a positive sense of the many diverse opportunities our county holds. Highlighting this diversity has been an ongoing priority of the WCTPA and this new initiative strives to take those efforts to new heights.

The importance of authenticity was a familiar refrain during the launch event, and Chase McClain, WCTPA Director of Marketing, provided some insight on the development of this campaign and on identifying local student Temperance Scott as the new voice of Washington County. "The narrative of Washington County is one of historical significance, modern ingenuity and collective community celebration, and who better to tell that story than one of our own young residents," McClain said.

In addition to our tourism partners, a number of local business and political leaders also attended the kick-off to our tourism season and announcement of the *The American Spirit Lives Here* marketing campaign, including the Washington County Board of Commissioners.

Board Chairman Larry Maggi offered his comments on the campaign and the overall





importance of tourism to the Washington County economy. Chairman Maggi expressed his excitement, saying "I am eager for everyone to get a chance to see this new marketing campaign. This is a perfect fit for Washington County because the American spirit truly does live here." He also touched on the economic impact of the tourism industry and how important it is for the Washington County economy. "According to our most recently available data, tourism accounted for over \$700 million in direct visitor spending and supports more than 6,000 jobs in the county," said Maggi.
