Why Not West Virginia?

When people think of West Virginia, they often think of its rugged beauty and vast natural resources. But what drew us to bring Core10 here was a far more important resource, the one that truly sets the state apart: its people.

So often, we've seen big companies move into West Virginia with promises of jobs and economic gains that amount to little more than empty words. At best, these companies bring a few low-wage jobs for a couple of years, meet their sales objectives, then pack up and move on.

This isn't new for West Virginians. Historically, people from across the globe have sought their fortunes in our state, collected a lucrative resource, and left. This history has made us resilient, creative, and wiser than most give us credit for.

As a West Virginia native, my - Joe's childhood was a magical experience. In fact, my entrepreneurial journey started with a morning paper route in Huntington. After college, I had to go where the jobs were, which meant I left West Virginia and grew businesses elsewhere. Sadly, this is what most young entrepreneurs do - they're enticed by big-city, coastal employers to leave our beautiful state, and they take their dollars with them.

But when the idea for Core10 began to take root, and Lee and I began the search for places to realize our dream, the first question we asked was, "Why not West Virginia?"

Since healthy financial institutions are so important to local economies, our vision was to provide financial institutions with the API integration, software development, and digital product implementation they need to extend their capabilities and serve the expanding needs of their customers. We also decided

that we want to train and employ talent based exclusively in the U.S. to help ensure that the high-paying jobs (and all the economic benefits that follow) are kept here in the States. To do this, we need access to talented people. And that's why West Virginia was and is top of mind for us.

After a number of years in the software industry, our experience has taught us that there's much more to a career in software than development. Development is important, of course, but software developers make up only about 20 percent of a company's employees. There are plenty of additional, great-paying jobs in this industry.

In fact, a career in software is a fantastic opportunity for anyone who uses technology. Most young people going into college have grown up with technology as a central part of their everyday lives. The job market for finance majors, history majors, accounting really anything - opens up considerably when people consider working in the software industry.

Core10 is unique in that we're only interested in projects where everyone involved wins. By that, we mean we pursue opportunities that create a positive ripple effect across a community, not ones that only benefit a few and exploit the rest. There's an expression we use around the office that summarizes this philosophy: A rising tide lifts all ships. Over the past four years, we believe the tide is rising in West Virginia, and we're thrilled to be a part of it.

So, back to our first question: Why not West Virginia? Here we've found all the ingredients we need for a successful business.

Entrepreneurial Spirit

The West Virginia Community and

Technical College System provides a program called Learn and Earn that prepares students for the wide array of technical jobs available in the growing software development community by working for West Virginia companies while still in school. Mountwest Community and Technical College has partnered with Core10 to add specialized curriculum and also listened intently to our needs as they and Generation West Virginia started up the NewForce coding bootcamp, a free six-month program that teaches software development skills and graduates job-ready developers. These initiatives reflect the collaborative mindset and entrepreneurial spirit of West Virginia.

"The Learn and Earn program is a win-win for students and employers," says West Virginia Higher Education Chancellor Sara Armstrong Tucker, Ph.D. "Students can gain real-world experience while earning a wage and going to school. Employers can ensure their future

Impact Fellows work, live, and volunteer across the Mountain State for a yearlong fellowship, providing them with a sense of place and purpose that is designed to entice them to stay.

We have found them to be top-notch, and every one of our Fellows has received a full-time job offer at the end of their fellowship year.
